PRESENTATION - APPLICATION 2 — DIWALI FESTIVAL OF LIGHTS CELEBRATION IN MANAWATŪ 2025 - MRS RAVINDER KAUR - via ZOOM

- Ravinder Kaur shared a presentation and thanked the meeting for the opportunity to speak to their application.

- She started dancing at 3 doing ballet, then moved into Jazz. She really enjoys the style called Commercial. Now a hip hop and jazz teacher, with nine classes. 4 12 years old.
- The music is her escape, a chance to step back and take a breath of fresh air. She wants to share this with others.
- Going on the tour, she will be exposed to auditions and agents and be able to prepare her students to go through this process.
- The opportunity came along through Dean McKerras attending a seminar. She completed an audition tape and explained her hopeful achievement, gaining admission to the tour.

- Cost is \$75 per student per term, or \$50 for multiple family members.
- Numbers are not confirmed until funding is available and there is a roll-over of students waiting to return.

- Rose is the Art Director at Square Edge, starting at the end of 2024. This will be the 9th year of the Art Trail.
- They have stopped using Cacia Birch as an art hub in Palmerston North, to concentrate on the trail rather than large central centres.
- She was looking forward to a shift and taking some risks, doing things differently so its more a hands-on experience for the visitors.
- This year the Art Trail will be split into two events, giving those without a studio the opportunity to present on the 3rd and 4th of May. They have also aligned the timing to miss school holidays and other events in the region. The reach of locations will depend on applications.

1 Background Ngā Kōrero o Muri

1.1 The Creative Communities Assessment Committee has received five Creative Communities Funding Scheme applications, totalling \$14,560.22. These applications cover a wide range of proposed community art projects in and around the Manawatū District.

- 2 Strategic Fit Te Tautika ki te Rautaki
- 2.1 The report and decision being sought aligns with the priorities of Council, as laid out in the Long-term Plan:
 - A place to belong and grow

We provide leisure and sports facilities and support community activities to encourage social and cultural wellbeing for everyone.

• A future planned together

We work with all parts of our community to plan for a future everyone can enjoy.

• An environment to be proud of

We protect and care for Manawatū District's natural and physical resources.

- 2.2 The Creative Communities Scheme links to the strategic priorities of "A place to belong and grow", "A future planned together" and "An environment to be proud of".
- 3 Discussion and Options Considered Ngā Matapakinga me ngā Kōwhiringa i Wānangahia
- 3.1 The funding available for the second round for 2025/26 is \$17,224.50.
- 3.2 The following is a summary of the four applications received:
 - Application 1: Affordable Art Classes. These aim to create inclusive, low-cost opportunities for young people in Feilding to explore creativity, build confidence, and connect with others in a safe, supportive environment. Four weekly classes will be offered during term four 2025 for students aged 5-15. Each session includes guided instruction, hands-on exploration, and opportunities for students to express themselves through various mediums
 - Application 2: Heidi and Sean Show. A theatre production as part of the Feilding Christmas Carnival to help bring the community together through laughter and excitement. The performance will take place three times over the space of the Carnival and is performed by specialist skilled performers.
 - Application 3: Beautification and Identify Mural The creation of a beautification and identity mural for Kiwitea School. The mural will not only enhance the physical environment but also serve as a living symbol of the school's values, community, and the growth of its students. This mural will be a "living" artwork. Each year, as new students enter the school, they will have the opportunity to contribute to the mural, symbolising their entry into the Kiwitea School family. This will create an evolving piece.
 - Application 4: In Our Twenties. A storytelling platform created by young women, for young women in direct response to the reality of record levels of anxiety, loneliness, and financial pressure in Aotearoa. 20 wāhine and tāhine, aged 20-29, from every region of Aotearoa will be invited to participate in a series of creative writing workshops to help them reflect on the defining moments of their twenties and document their experiences in personal essays that will then be compiled in a one-of-a-kind print and digital magazine. This will all be done virtually.

- Application 5: Embracing the tides: Protecting Moana. A month-long art exhibition
 celebrating Sea Week 2026 taking place at the Feilding Arts Society, with a strong focus
 on environmental protection and marine conservation. The project will involve local
 schools, with outreach made to them in November 2025. The exhibition proper will run
 late February to March 2025 and will feature ocean-inspired paintings and awareness
 art made from beach-found materials.
- 3.3 Of the five applicants, four have indicated that they wish to speak in support of their application. They have therefore been invited to attend the meeting on 30th September 2025
- 4 Risk Assessment Te Arotake Tūraru
- 4.1 Not applicable.
- 5 Engagement Te Whakapānga

Significance of Decision

5.1 The Council's Significance and Engagement Policy is not triggered by matters discussed in this report. No stakeholder engagement is required.

Māori and Cultural Engagement

- 5.2 There are no known cultural considerations associated with the matters addressed in this report. No specific engagement with Māori or other ethnicity groups is necessary.
- 5.3 A Māori appointed representative sits on the Creative Communities Assessment Committee and is part of the decision-making process.
- 5.4 Te Kīwai is the engagement process which guides Council's practice and ensures the onus to engage and include Māori is shared between Council and all partners. In this manner, we progress both the articles and principles of Te Tiriti o Waitangi by maintaining the balance between Kawanatanga (Governance) of the Council and Tino Rangatiratanga (Sovereignty) of whānau, hapū, and iwi Māori.

Community Engagement

- 5.5 An advertisement was placed in the District News, (and resultingly the Feilding and District Herald) calling for applications for Round 1 of 2025/26 Creative Communities Scheme Funding. Applications were also invited through Facebook both on Council's and the Manawatu Community Hub Libraries' Facebook page as well as sponsored posts, with information also being provided on Council's website. Posts also went up on Antenno. Applications opened on 1 August and closed on 31 August 2025.
- 6 Operational Implications Ngā Pānga Whakahaere
- 6.1 There are no operational implications with this report.

- 7 Financial Implications Ngā Pānga Ahumoni
- 7.1 Creative New Zealand provides annual funding to Council to distribute on their behalf. There is no impact on Council's finances. The amount of funding available for allocation for Round One 2025/26 is \$17,224.50
- 8 Statutory Requirements Ngā Here ā-Ture
- 8.1 There are no statutory requirements for this report. There are no statutory requirements in relation to this matter. However, the Manawatū District Council is an agent for Creative New Zealand and is required to distribute funding in accordance with Creative New Zealand guidelines.

- 9.1 The Creative Communities Assessment Committee has full delegated authority to make allocations in accordance with Creative New Zealand Funding Guidelines.

 - Apply the schemes funding criteria i.e. all projects must meet one of the funding criteria
 - Use the Assessors Guide and Assessment Scale to govern decisions

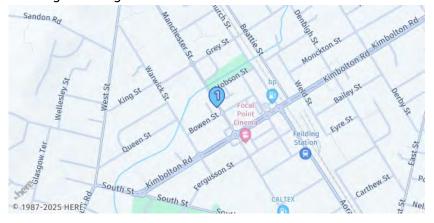

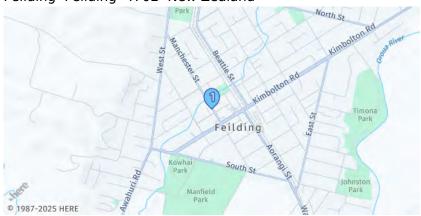

We've seen firsthand how perfectionism, especially from age 11, stifles creativity. Many students fear trying new things, worried their work won't measure up - often shaped by

Project Process and Key Stages - Affordable Art Classes, Term 4

The Feilding and District Art Society is proud to deliver Affordable Art Classes - a vibrant, inclusive programme designed to nurture creativity in children and youth across our region. These after-school classes run for eight weeks each term and are grouped by age and ability to ensure tailored support and meaningful engagement. In Term 4, we will offer four weekly classes for students aged 5–15, with a focus on community connection, cultural celebration, and creative development.

Stage 1: Planning and Preparation

The project begins with securing funding to ensure accessibility and sustainability. Materials are sourced, class schedules confirmed, and promotional outreach begins through schools, social media, and community networks. Enrolment is managed by our team, with discounted rates available for families with multiple children attending. This stage ensures that no child is excluded due to financial barriers.

Stage 2: Weekly Art Classes

Led by Eris Newson, classes are held at the Feilding Art Centre on Tuesdays and Thursdays beginning in the second week of the school term.

Term 4 will feature three key creative initiatives:

- 1. Youth Awards Preparation Students will develop original artworks to submit for the November Youth Awards, fostering pride and public recognition of their talents.
- 2. Raranga Collaboration In partnership with our Raranga Group, students will help refresh the harakeke wreaths on the Feilding clock tower, learning traditional weaving techniques and contributing to a cherished community symbol.
- 3. Festive Harakeke Creations Students will design and craft harakeke Christmas trees and decorations, blending cultural heritage with seasonal celebration.

These projects connect students to local traditions, offer opportunities for public contribution, and deepen their understanding of art as a tool for storytelling and community building.

Her classes are especially well suited to neurodivergent learners, offering flexible, strengths-based approaches that celebrate individuality and imagination.

Eris is also a practising artist, with a portfolio that includes solo exhibitions, interactive community installations, and participation in numerous collective art shows. She works with a wide range of materials and techniques, and while she considers herself largely self-taught

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in studio practice, her lifelong dedication to artmaking informs every aspect of her teaching. In addition to her role as lead educator, Eris is the Manager of the Feilding Art Centre, where she oversees exhibitions, outreach, and community programming. Her leadership ensures that the Affordable Art Classes are well-integrated into the wider arts ecosystem, with strong connections to local artists, cultural groups, and community initiatives.

Eris will be supported by a team of volunteers and board members, many of whom assist with class setup, student support, and resource management. Their contributions help maintain a welcoming, well-organised environment where students can thrive.

This term, our Affordable Art Classes will centre on the theme of diversity, with a strong focus on honouring and exploring the artistic and cultural traditions of our local communities — particularly those rooted in Māori culture.

Through hands-on creative projects, students will engage with the tikanga (customs and practices) surrounding raranga (weaving) and the gathering of harakeke (flax). These sessions will be guided by respectful learning and collaboration, including a partnership with our local Raranga Group. Students will learn about the significance of harakeke in Māori tradition — not only as a material, but as a symbol of whānau, connection, and care — and will apply this knowledge in the creation of harakeke wreaths for the Feilding clock tower.

In addition, students will explore the cultural history of Christmas decorations, considering how festive traditions vary across households and communities. They will design and craft their own harakeke Christmas trees and ornaments, incorporating elements that reflect their personal values, family traditions, and cultural backgrounds. This approach encourages students to celebrate their own identities while learning about others - fostering empathy, pride, and creative expression.

By weaving together traditional Māori art forms, contemporary festive practices, and student-led storytelling, this project delivers meaningfully to the diversity criterion. It supports the preservation and sharing of local cultural knowledge, empowers young people to explore their heritage, and strengthens community connections through collaborative art.

The Society is administrated by a committee accountable to and elected by the Society members.

The Society's Art Centre is professionally managed by one full-time employee who works in conjunction with an elected committee and one part time employee who reports to the Manager. Together, management and the Committee are embedding operating practices intended to ensure the Society's long-term sustainability.

Main Sources of Entity's Cash and Resources

The major sources of funds are Manawatū Art Expo (46%), grants and sponsors (29%), and income raised from activities at Feilding Art Centre (17.5%).

Main Methods Used by Entity to Raise Funds

The Society undertakes one major fundraiser every year (Manawatū Art Expo) with a few smaller fundraisers (Calendar and Colouring book) and makes applications to various trusts and grant-funding bodies for project and operational funding. Funds from operating activities at Feilding Art Centre include income from art classes and workshop fees, exhibition entry fees, Gallery hire, commission on art sales, and donations from individuals.



Entity's Reliance on Volunteers and Donated Goods or Services

The Society's committee comprises six volunteers. Additionally, a further 30 volunteers deliver core service at Feilding Art Centre, with another 10 volunteering outside of the centre for our fundraisers and community events. Together, all volunteers contributed around 3,600 hours of their time to the Society in 2024/25.

2024-2025 Outcomes

This year we worked to establish and re-establish our long-term relationships with businesses that will continue to support us with sponsorship and benefits. Local business like Darraghs Mitre10, Peter Shelton – Building Solutions, and Ray Barnett's Svendsen Photography, who continue to support us with our calendar, discounts and contributions to the centre in kind and contributing to the everyday running of the Art Centre and making it a little more viable. Our business relationships now include a \$5000+ sponsorship agreement across the Art Centre activities with Craigs Investment Partners.

This last year our Art Centre also had a focus on both marketing and promoting ourselves as being an Art hub run by Artists for Artists and putting the Art Centre 'on the map'. Much of this has been achieved through social media posts, regular radio advertising, and newspaper articles with Stuff and the Wellington regional News.

As the Art Centre continues to grow it is important that we maintain and build our local audience and connections, as these are the people who will visit us most frequently and bring in their families and friends. This year we will begin receiving the MDC Priority Services grant of \$5000 per annum for the next 3 years. Our local Council would love to see us use this to connect more with the community. As such, for the next year, we will be aiming to have greater involvement with local events, and to bring our community in with our regular 'have-a-go' style community exhibitions, held during school holidays.

Additional Information

<u>Visitation:</u> Our Visitation to the Art Centre continues to increase, with a 5% increase recorded this year. In addition, we had our first month with over 1000 visitors recorded. This was in October 2024 when we held out Art Awards and we were a hub for the Manawatu Art Trail.

Membership: As expected, this year, our Membership has had a decrease since our increase of fees, which was approved at our 2023 AGM and put in place from the beginning of this last financial year. However, there doesn't seem to have been a decrease in members involvement. The Arts Collective and Members Awards' had close to the same amount of entries and our 'Have-a-go' groups are still growing in popularity. It seems that those signing up as members are those that have been, and continue to be, actively involved with the Art Centre.



Exhibitions: The number of exhibitions held this year is a little less than the previous year as we have had a few more dual zone exhibitions.

Art and Shop Sales: Sales have had a massive increase this year with the Manawatu Art EXPO Art Sales contributing to over \$100,000.00 of Sales. The increase from our Shop and Gallery Sales is nearly as much as last year's sales with EXPO combined. This increase in sales may be a result of the marketing undertaken for our EXPO, Art Awards and events like the XMAS Art Sale. Workshops: This year we continued to build on the number of Affordable Art Classes we run which has included an adult group. These classes have continued to grow in popularity and are often booked out. Our Artist-led workshops have continued to be minimal due to a lack of funding to support them, however we have had an increase in artist talks, demonstrations and workshops to complement what is on display in the gallery spaces.

The Feilding and District Art Society Incorporated For the year ended 31 March 2025

Reporting Enity

These financials have been prepared for The Feilding and District Art Society Incorporated. The Feilding and District Art Society is incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and is a registered charity registered under the Charities Act 2005.

Basis of Preparation

The Feilding and District Art Society Incorporated has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

Feilding & District Art Society Inc is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable for the sale of goods and services, excluding goods and services tax rebates and discounts, to the extent it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the entity and revenue can be reliably measured.

Sales of services are recognised in the period by reference to the stage of completion of the transaction at the end of the reporting period.

Interest received is recognised as interest accrues, gross of refundable tax credits received.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at historical cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure directly attributable to the acquisition of assets, and includes the cost of replacements that are eligible for capitalisation when these are incurred.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognised. Upon derecognition, the asset revaluation reserve relating to the asset disposed shall be transferred to retained earnings.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of Feilding & District Promotion Incorporated

Opinion

We have audited the special purpose financial statements of Feilding & District Promotion Incorporated on pages 2 to 7 which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2024, and the statement of financial performance and statement of movements in equity for the year then ended, and the notes to the financial statements, including a statement of accounting policies.

In our opinion, the financial statements on pages 2 to 7 present fairly the financial position of the Feilding & District Promotion Incorporated as at 30 June 2024, and the financial performance for the year then ended, and are prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with the accounting policies as described on pages 5 and 6.

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Reporting Entity:

These are the Special Purpose Financial Statements for Feilding & District Promotion Incorporated, a society established under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 on 7 April 2016.

These Special Purpose Financial Statements have been prepared for the Executive Committee only.

Basis of Accounting:

The accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of earnings and financial position on an historical cost basis have been used, with the exception of certain items for which specific accounting policies have been identified.

(a) Revenue Recognition

- Memberships

Memberships are recorded as revenue on a cash basis as received

- Grants and Donations

Grants and donations are recorded as revenue when received unless specific conditions associated with the grant have not been met in which case a liability is recorded

- Agency Income/Commissions

Feilding and District Promotions acts in an agency capacity for a number of organisations both local and national. Sales made in an agency capacity are recorded as a liability once the sale is made with commission recorded as income.

(b) Property, Plant & Equipment & Depreciation

The entity has the following classes of fixed assets:

Plant & Equipment Motor Vehicles

Fixed assets acquired from Feilding Promotion Incorporated are recorded at the net book value at the date transferred less any subsequent accumulated depreciation. Purchases made by Feilding & Districts Promotion Incorporated are recorded at cost less any subsequent accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation is calculated on a diminishing value basis using rates specified by IRD.

(c) Goods & Services Tax

These financial statements have been prepared on a GST exclusive basis.

(d) Income Tax

Feilding and District Promotion is exempt from Income Tax under section CW40 on the Income Tax Act 2007

(e) Investments

Investments are carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

(f) Receivables

Receivables are stated at their estimated realisable value. Bad debts are written off in the year in which they are identified.

(g) Inventory

Inventory is recorded at cost on a first in first out (FIFO) basis.

(h) Reserves

Business Promotions

Business Promotions is a self-funded activity of Feilding and District Promotions with member businesses paying annual contributions in exchange for member benefits

Farmers Market

The Feilding Farmers Market is a self-funded activity of Feilding and District Promotion with stall holders paying weekly attendance fees which are then used to promote the market

There have been no changes in accounting policies. All policies have been applied on bases consistent with those used in previous years.

This exhibition aims to raise awareness of how our everyday actions affect both local ecosystems and the wider ocean environment. Through marine-themed paintings and artworks made from beach-found materials, the project encourages reflection and change. Each piece will feature a QR code linking to educational videos about ocean threats and practical ways to help.

The artistic goal is to inspire environmental responsibility through creativity, especially among youth. School engagement and hands-on workshops will deepen impact.

Through this project, I hope to spark greater awareness of marine conservation and the ways our everyday choices affect vulnerable ocean species—even here in landlocked Manawatū. The exhibition is designed not only to showcase marine-themed art, but to ignite curiosity, reflection, and action. By involving local schools in Sea Week activities, I aim to foster a sense of environmental responsibility and creative engagement in young people. I want students and visitors alike to leave with a deeper understanding of how plastic use, waste disposal, and consumer habits ripple outward to impact our oceans. My goal is to inspire small, meaningful changes—because even inland communities play a vital role in protecting marine ecosystems. Art is a powerful tool for storytelling and change, and I hope this exhibition becomes a catalyst for ongoing conversations, community involvement, and a shared commitment to safeguarding our seas.

This exhibition builds on a successful Sea Week initiative I ran in 2025 at Te Takeretanga o Kura-hau-pō in Horowhenua, where I invited local schools to engage with marine conservation through art and education. I shared resources via a page on my website (http s://www.alissajane.com/ourlandourseaourresponsibility), including both original content and curated links. For the upcoming project, I aim to expand the scope and deepen engagement with schools by creating a more interactive and cohesive experience.

The first stage involves outreach to local schools in mid-November 2025, toward the end of Term 4. This timing allows teachers to explore the resources ahead of Term 1 planning, fostering stronger integration into classroom learning. I'll offer opportunities for teachers to connect with me directly, enabling collaboration and tailored support for their students. The goal is to create a unified teaching experience that blends science, creativity, and conservation.

From now until the exhibition, I'll be actively collecting beach materials—both natural and man-made—to use in student workshops and exhibition displays. These found objects will serve as inspiration and raw materials for creative exploration. I plan to produce 12 large shadow box artworks (50cm x 50cm), with six pieces made from marine debris and six from natural elements like shells and driftwood. These will form part of the community interaction zone, encouraging reflection on our relationship with the ocean and the impact of our waste.

In parallel, I'll be completing 12 new oil paintings to complement my existing collection of marine-themed works. These pieces will explore different aspects of ocean life and conservation, adding depth and visual storytelling to the exhibition. I currently have 10 completed paintings that align with the theme, and the new works will expand the narrative and visual diversity of the show.

To support the educational component, I'll be developing additional videos and digital resources that highlight key conservation issues, such as plastic pollution, habitat degradation, and threats to marine and estuary species. These materials will be freely available to schools and the public, helping to extend the reach of the exhibition beyond the gallery walls.

Throughout the process, I'll maintain close communication with local schools and other interested parties to ensure the exhibition remains relevant, accessible, and impactful. By combining art, science, and education, this project aims to inspire meaningful conversations and actions that support marine conservation—especially in inland communities like Manawatū, where the connection to the sea may feel distant but is no less important.

How the Project Delivers on Access and Participation

This project is designed to maximise community participation through a blend of visual art, environmental education, and hands-on engagement. By combining formal exhibition with interactive experiences open to the general public and school-based workshops, it creates multiple pathways for people of all ages and backgrounds to connect with conservation through creativity.

The exhibition will be hosted at the Feilding Arts Society, which is providing two distinct zones:

- Zone 1 will feature professionally displayed artworks created by Alissa Jane Dyer, a local artist and science educator with a background in marine biology and zoology. These beautiful works of marine animals and environment will highlight why we should care about their protection and the videos linked with QR codes will incorporate conservation themes, making the exhibition both visually compelling and environmentally relevant.

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- Zone 2 will serve as a community engagement space. Around the walls, there will be artworks created with marine debris as well as natural beach materials. Visitors will be encouraged to interact with the provided beach materials, contribute to collaborative art pieces, and create their own artworks with pieces of the sea to take home. This format ensures that the exhibition is not only accessible to art audiences but also welcoming to families, students, and the wider public.

To further enhance participation, the project includes direct collaboration with the schools in Feilding and the surrounding districts. Alissa will coordinate school visits and provide tailored educational resources that link the conservation themes of sea week. Eris Newson, Manager of the Feilding Arts Society, will oversee scheduling to ensure group sizes remain manageable (maximum 30 students per session), allowing for a focused and enriching experience. Eris has also volunteered to lead art workshops with students, guiding them in the creation of found beach art. These sessions offer young people a hands-on opportunity to explore environmental themes through creative practice.

By integrating exhibition, education, and community art-making, the project removes barriers to participation and fosters a welcoming, inclusive environment. Young wāhine in Aotearoa are facing an urgent and compounding crisis: rising loneliness, financial pressure, and mental-health challenges are disproportionately affecting people in their late teens and twenties. Recent data shows 18–24-year-olds in Aotearoa report the lowest levels of happiness, health, and sense of purpose compared to all other age groups. Our happiness ranking plummets from 11th to 27th when focusing on those under 30, and 50%+ face anxiety or depression. Economic stress (71% struggle to pay for essentials), existential worry, and climate anxiety (45% say climate concerns interfere with daily life) adds to these pressures.

At the same time, few creative pathways let young people process these pressures in a supported, skill-based way. Traditional arts pathways are often inaccessible - costly, geographically centralised, or culturally exclusionary. Everyday lived experience, particularly from diverse regional and wahine voices, is under-represented in Aotearoa's cultural record.

This project creates the space for young woman to reflect, process, and share their experiences in a supportive environment.

Through workshops and mentoring, participants will explore the craft of writing - including structure, voice, language, and editing - and will be supported to experiment with creative techniques that enable them to capture their stories with honesty, artistry, and confidence.

Beyond producing their own piece of work, they will also build lifelong creative skills in storytelling, self-expression, and communication - skills proven to nurture resilience, strengthen identity, and foster connection at a time when young Kiwis are struggling.

The resulting magazine will go on to impact thousands - normalising the messy, beautiful,

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and sometimes painful process of growing into yourself; celebrating the strength, creativity, and determination of our shared experiences; and transforming the voices of today's young wahine into a lasting source of hope, strength, and solidarity.

Outreach to contributing authors (November 2025)

An open call and outreach campaign will identify 20 contributors - including one from Manawatū - with a focus on diverse voices, backgrounds, and experiences. Contributors do not need to be writers by trade; the aim is to support everyday people to develop their stories into art. Outreach will be carried out through social media, community networks, tertiary institutions, and youth organisations to ensure strong regional and cultural representation.

Workshop 1 (January 2026).

Contributors will take part in a virtual creative writing workshop led by an award-winning facilitator. This session will focus on drawing out defining moments, themes, and turning points of their twenties. Through guided exercises, participants will begin to shape raw personal experiences into story ideas.

Workshop 2 (February 2026)

A second virtual workshop with an award-winning journalist will focus on the craft of writing. Participants will be introduced to key techniques - structure, voice, pacing, language, and editing - and practice turning their reflections into written scenes. The workshop will also cover how to balance vulnerability with narrative clarity, helping participants craft essays that are both emotionally authentic and accessible to readers.

Writing journey (March - June 2026)

Over a three-month period, contributors will independently draft and refine their essays. Each participant will receive two hours of one-on-one coaching, offering personalised feedback on both the creative and technical elements of their work. A private peer community will allow participants to share progress, exchange drafts, and encourage one another - fostering connection as well as accountability.

Professional editing (June 2026)

Once essays are submitted, they will be compiled into a magazine. A professional editor will refine the work while preserving the integrity of each author's voice. Contributors will be consulted during the editing process so they can learn from professional feedback and feel a sense of shared ownership of the final text.

Publication and promotion (August 2026)

The magazine will be published both digitally and as a limited-edition print run by Inkwise, ensuring professional design and high production values. To maximise reach, a collaborative digital marketing campaign will be launched, leveraging contributor networks and aligned community partners. Launch events (both online and in-person where possible) will further celebrate the work, spotlight contributors, and place their stories in the wider literary and

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creative landscape of Aotearoa.

I am an award-winning community leader with 10+ years experience volunteering and working across the non-profit sector, and alongside purpose-led small business owners, predominantly in project management, communications, fundraising and event management roles.

My career highlights include leading a first-of-its-kind sustainability project that diverted 16,000 single-use cups from landfill, designing a record-breaking fundraising campaign in response to an emerging humanitarian crisis, raising \$88,000 for charity through a series of community fundraising events, and developing an Annual Report that received nationwide industry recognition.

I'm also the Founder of two Charitable Trusts - one award-winning collective that mobilised 2,000 people to volunteer their time and skills for good causes, and another that has raised \$30,000 for the Salvation Army through charity football events.

Recently, I have reconnected with my childhood love of writing. I have been published in Ramona Magazine, Progress Magazine, Focus Magazine, and Billie Magazine, and am currently studying with the London School of Journalism.

In February, I started a weekly Substack, where I'm interviewing 100 women from across the globe, and telling their stories as they reflect on the love, friendship, uncertainty, heartbreak, and growth that defines this decade. 2,212 people have engaged with these stories, and 113,822 people have been reached via social media.

From interviewees saying the process helped them better understand and articulate their own experiences, to readers sharing that they felt seen, heard, and understood, it's clear there's both a hunger for these stories and a power in sharing them.

In Our Twenties brings together these two strands of my work: my proven ability to design and deliver large-scale projects, and my passion for storytelling and creative expression. I am deeply driven to create a space for young women to process and honour their experiences, and to build a platform where our stories can uplift, empower, and guide the next generation.

This project - both the workshops and the magazine - is something I wish I'd had in my early twenties, when I felt the loss of the community, support, and connection we often take for granted in childhood. I'm excited to create something lasting to the literary and cultural landscape of Aotearoa.

Cloe is an award-winning New Zealand journalist with 12 years of experience in the industry.

She is the founder of EQ Storytelling, a consultancy dedicated to helping people share their stories authentically, and a published children's author.

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the writing workshops and one-on-one coaching, empowering them to hone their storytelling skills and share their personal stories with confidence and authenticity.

This project will create meaningful opportunities for a young wāhine from Manawatū to access and participate in the arts through creative writing and storytelling. For many young people, particularly those outside traditional arts pathways, there are limited opportunities to develop their voice in a supported, professional environment. These workshops will remove barriers to participation by providing free, guided access to awardwinning facilitators, mentoring, and a national publishing opportunity. Participants will not be expected to arrive as "writers" - instead, the project recognises the value of everyday voices and lived experiences as a powerful and legitimate form of creative expression.

Through the workshops and mentoring, the Manawatū wāhine will:

- Gain the skills and confidence to craft and share her own story, empowering her to take ownership of her narrative.
- Connect with professional writers and editors, expanding her creative abilities and understanding of the writing process.
- Be part of an inclusive community that celebrates diversity of experience and perspective, and validates the unique journeys of young people today.
- Contribute their work to a national anthological magazine that amplifies the voices of young women and places them within Aotearoa's contemporary literary landscape.

The project delivers value to Manawatū's arts and culture by investing in the next generation of local creatives and giving them a platform to be heard. It fosters pride and belonging by ensuring Manawatū stories are represented in a national creative work, while also building skills that participants can carry into future creative, personal, and professional pursuits. Ultimately, the project is about opening doors to the arts for young people who may not otherwise have had the opportunity, and participation by ensuring that their voices are not only heard, but celebrated and preserved in a keepsake publication that will resonate for years to come.
